Letter From the Pastor

Jeremiah 29:11 I know the plans I have in mind for you, declares the Lord; they are plans for peace, not disaster, to give you a future filled with hope.

We Have a Strategic God

God's people are called to think strategically about the future. We see this in the book of Nehemiah. The people lived in exile. The Babylonians took many of the Israelites into captivity but released them from captivity fifty years later. The book of Nehemiah is set after their release from captivity. Nehemiah is a Jewish man who went to live in Persia after gaining his freedom. He became a high official in the Persian court. God had plans for Nehemiah because things in Jerusalem were not good.

Back in Jerusalem, the Temple had been rebuilt a few years before. Another Jewish man, Zerubbabel, asked the King of Persia to help rebuild the Temple. They rebuilt the Temple. However, the city was being destroyed and the Temple was being attacked regularly.

Nehemiah hears about the attacks. When Nehemiah hears that the Temple and the people are being robbed and beaten, he is distressed and moved to act. When the Babylonians destroyed the city, they also took down the wall that surrounded the city. Ancient city walls acted as a protection from daily raids. But Jerusalem was without a wall. So Nehemiah decides they must rebuild the wall around Jerusalem.

Nehemiah immediately begins to think of a strategy to help Jerusalem. He employs strategy in several ways. First, Nehemiah petitions the King of Persia to help again. He reminds the King that he helped rebuild the Temple and all his work is now being destroyed. Then, he asks the King for permission to lead a team to rebuild Jerusalem's wall. Next, he asks for supplies and people to finish the project.

When they arrive in Jerusalem, the situation is worse than they thought. Whenever the Jews make progress in rebuilding, enemies attack and destroy any gained progress. Nehemiah enacts strategy again. He strategically recruits Jewish workers to join the Persian workers so they can build the wall quicker. He then devises a plan to provide security as they work. He provides weapons for the workers, so they have a hammer in one hand and a sword in the other. He must also protect their work in progress, or their enemies will destroy it each night. He also reminds the people of who they are by reestablishing worship in the Temple. In addition he needs to decide how to support the people while they work. Each stage requires him to approach problems with strategic and creative thinking. St. Augustine understands strategic thinking. We are busy strategically making plans for the future. We are following in Nehemiah's footsteps in building God's work. The Vestry, Stewardship, Outreach and the Marketing Team are working on plans. We are facing new possibilities. Since we are selling the three parcels of land, we are in conversation about the possibilities for our future. The Vestry is working on strategic plans, goals, and objectives for our future.

Strategic plans are necessary because they help us to decide on a direction to focus our efforts. Without that focus we can work in a thousand directions without going anywhere. A strategic plan will allow us to work towards a common goal. We can align our resources towards that goal and prioritize where our resources go. We are currently working on clearly defined goals and objectives. We are also creating action plans to go with those objectives. The Vestry's strategic plan and goals are laid out below. <u>Please read them</u>. We will be discussing the details of this goals with the whole congregation. We are interested in your feedback and input. There will be collective meetings to hear from you about the plans. St. Augustine has big things planned for our future to continue in our mission and vision. I cannot wait to see what God does with us!







April 7, 2024: Ministry Moment: Lay Eucharistic Ministers and Lay Eucharistic Visitors

Pastor Anny called two members of the parish to speak about two important ministries.

Jack Buffington is the long-time coordinator for Lay Eucharistic Ministers. The purpose of a Lay Eucharistic Minister is to assist Pastor Anny in serving bread and wine during communion.

Lucy Martin recently assumed responsibility as the coordinator for Lay Eucharistic Visitors. The purpose for a Lay Eucharistic Visitor is to take the bread and wine to members of the parish who are unable to attend church on Sunday, usually for medical reasons. The Lay Eucharistic Visitor should have the ability to listen, be discreet, maintain confidences, and provide spiritual company. The Lay Eucharistic Visitor serves approximately three weeks during a two-month period. Lucy was commissioned by Pastor Anny during the service.

Ray's Games: Hide and Go Sheep

On Sunday, April 28, 2024, Ray Genato hosted a fun, educational activity for the St. Augustine kids. Ray hid small sheep toys around the church property and the object was for the kids to be good shepherds, find their lost sheep, hook the sheep to the staff, and return the sheep to safety.

The kids made their own hooked staff. The staff was a long stick with a hook used by shepherds to guide sheep and protect them from harm. Each kid was given a compass and directions to find their lost sheep. Then the kids scattered over the church property to find the sheep. The kids were able to find their sheep and bring them home to safety.

The symbolism involved was explained to the kids identifying Christ as our Good Shepherd. The straight part of the staff is the symbol of authority and righteous rule. The curved part of the staff is symbolic of reaching out to draw people to Christ and to prevent the sheep from straying. The staff signifies qualities such as boundaries, trustworthiness and sacrifice. The staff shows the shepherd is a good provider.

May Ray's Kids Sunday






Spring Concert by St Augustine Choir




Aubrey Cooper


